CLERK: Yes, sir. Mr. President, the next amendment I have is by Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: May I just say this that the Chair has the privilege of announcing on behalf of Senator Peterson that he has guests under the south balcony, Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Mrsny and John Mrsny, and Leroy and Janice Hintz from Norfolk, Nebraska. We welcome you for your visit to our Legislature today. Thank you for coming down. Stand and be recognized, please. You say you have a Senator Chambers amendment? The call of the house is raised.

CLERK: Senator, the amendment that I have is the one that removes the word "Nebraska" every time it appears? Okay. (Senator Chambers' amendment appears on pages 510-11 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers. May we have order in the Chamber, please. (Gavel.) Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Khomeini and...I mean, Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, you couldn't have done it by yourself. This amendment is designed to remove the word "Nebraska" from the name of these two funds so that there is no identification with the state as such. I have talked to Senator Barrett and he does not disagree. But he had an amendment that he wanted to offer that would make it the "Ernie Chambers Guaranty Fund" and, naturally, I was opposed to that and in case I am not here and he tries to run it, absolutely am I opposed to it. But as I got to thinking about Senator Johnson's amendment that we just refused to allow to be considered, maybe the name should not be stricken, the term "Nebraska" should not be stricken altogether, it should be altered by the addition of an "ns", Nebraskans' Guaranty Fund, since the Nebraskans or the taxpayers are the ones who are going to be gouged as a result of the operation.

PRESIDENT: (Gavel.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's all right, Mr. Chairman, they are not listening, they don't need to. I just made my...
