SENATOR BEUTLER: One minute.

So be it. There is many a farmer that have taken a lot of loss also, you must remember and I think they're all in this together and they're all at fault. You can't just tell one, the farmer, he overextended. I think the banker was a little greedy also. So let's really think about this when we vote on this issue. I think we'd better get rid of it. Thank you.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I want to point out some inconsistencies that have taken place here several times this morning. Senator Vard Johnson, the introducer of the kill motion, alluded to it and Senator Hefner was very specific in his comments when he stated that the Legislature refused to deal with the issue of the corporate farm or anticorporate farm legislation. I served as Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture for a dozen years. Each year that bill was introduced it was introduced by a wide variety of legislators, some of them conservative, some of them liberal, some of them Democrat, some of them Republican. Each time the issue was introduced it was heard by the committee. Several times it came to the floor. Every time that it was introduced there was an Attorney General's Opinion which stated emphatically that the Constitution prior to 1984 rendered the anticorporate farm legislation as proposed unconstitutional. Now, maybe there are some of you on this floor who will willingly, knowingly, otherwise enact a bill that is unconstitutional, but the majority of us would not. Never once in those dozen years that I served as
