SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President and members, I know you are probably getting tired of this issue because it seems to be that the body has made up its mind. But I just want to one more time point out what you just got through doing. I am not in favor of strict bill limitations. I never have been. You just got through guaranteeing that in 1992 there will be another bill introduced to do the same thing and we do it time after time after time after time because we don't have the guts to do away with something and I don't know any other way to put it. It is clear western Nebraska English. You don't have the guts to do away with it but you don't have the guts to say we want to leave it there forever either. And then you turn around and say, why do we have so many bills introduced? Well, that is why. This is a dumb idea. We had ought not to do it. We had ought not to continue a duplication of services simply because some fine folk that are out there that some folks like, and I like them too. But if they are doing their job, they can do it as part of an NRD. They don't have to have a conservation district to do it. I urge you to vote against the advancement of LB 124. Thank you, Mr. President.
