They were caught time after time after time driving that car for anything they wanted to do. They soon forgot about the fact, many of them, that they had to be driving to and from work. Again, here we go back to the other situation. A lawyer drives around all day long at his work, so do many other businessmen, so do other people who work in the business. They drive all day long and you're going back, Senator Hoagland, back to where you were, but you opened the crack so you'll live with it. I hope Senator Chambers gets his way. I'm not going to support it, but it would just do my heart good to see you cringe for opening it up again. Senator Hoagland, I wasn't in on any deal that you made. I didn't know there were deals being made, but this is a carefully balanced bill, as you say, carefully balanced as far as Senator Hoagland is concerned. To heck with the rest of us. You don't give a darn what the rest of us think, apparently, so you balanced the bill, now you keep it balanced. It will be fun to watch you keep this balanced. Thank you.
