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SENATOR HOAGLAND: That's true, and let me finish, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I want to know what is true. Did they misquote you?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: No, that article did not misquote me.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, so then let's go because I don't want to argue my whole time away. Is it your contention then that taxi drivers, as a class, and truck drivers as a class would be more likely to drive drunk again on the job than all these other people who would be able to get these permits?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. If they are not going to drive, as a class, drunk under these permits, Senator Hoagland, as a lawyer they don't take a Hippocratic oath as the doctors do to try to do everything they can to cure, lawyers don't take that kind of an oath. But their job is to uphold the law and justice. Justice, when you are in law school, you are taught is a higher principle than the mere statements of the law as written in statutes because laws, in statute books, are often written for specific purposes other than to achieve justice. So Senator Hoagland can stand here and say that the two classes that he has exempted or excluded are not more likely to cause damage than the ones he has left in. That is a built-in injustice. He wants you, he wants me to vote for a bill which, out of his own mouth, comes evidence that is unjust. How are we able to justify putting into statute a principle which you know, on its face, is discriminatory. That is totally improper. Senator Hoagland mentioned that salesmen might lose their jobs. And, Senator Hoagland, salesmen have contributed to Americana. You know the old jokes about the salesman and the farmer's daughter. So you might even tie in the farm crisis some how, but I won't try to do that right now because I don't have enough time. But they drive a lot of miles too and yet they get to keep a license. This is a preposterous bill. What I am trying to do is show that Senator Hoagland and the ones supporting this bill are not interested in preserving the means of livelihood for people
