

must be discussed and I am going to discuss it because I made a promise the other day and I didn't give the complete statement. What I should have said, instead of that I would harry and badger this bill until it dies one way or the other, I should have added, or unless it is changed to bring about justice and equity. This is a step in that direction. It is narrowing those groups of persons who could get a license to drive after they have been once convicted of driving under the influence. And I think it would be a bad policy for the state to allow its drivers to get one of these permits. And I am going to use a hackneyed expression that occurs at all levels of government and throughout society. It would be sending the wrong signal for the state, once the issue has been raised in the way that I am raising it, to say that those who are going to be driving government vehicles as a part of their job are going to be allowed to get one of these permits after being convicted of drunk driving. What kind of example is that setting? The state itself is condoning drunk driving by giving such a permit and I will not, I shall not, I cannot, I dare not allow such a thing to happen without fighting it. So we are going to be here at least till noon struggling with this very difficult issue. I intend to hold the feet of the Legislature to the fire on this issue and we are going to kill this bill. It is not going to see the light of day this session as a piece of enacted law. It must die. And I have seen movies, when I was a child, about Frankenstein, and there was one called The Monster Must Die, but somehow they could never keep him killed because there was a way to make money. After Frankenstein died, yes, Senator DeCamp, we had the Bride of Frankenstein and they never were allowed to consummate the marriage because she was created with enough sense to see what Frankenstein was. And when she saw him, her hair stood straight on her head just like that of Don King and she rejected the monster, whose name, by the way, was not Frankenstein, John, it was Herman. Frankenstein was the name of the doctor who created him. This is an educational experience that we are going through. Senator Johnson said the other day that I like disorganized chaos better than organized poverty, or something like that. And he is right, we all do. There is a tiny little creature about this size or smaller wearing an animal skin, Senator Hall, carrying a club with a nail in the end of it that typifies that long ago origin of the human species which the creationists say never occurred, but it did. Deep in his soul, carefully hidden, Senator Marsh. lies a desire to be
