SENATOR GOLL: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, I would just like to call to the attention of this body when we advance this bill that remarks have been made that this is a bill that helps Omaha and does not affect any other district, so that when my bill comes up here in a couple of days that does not affect Omaha, or Lincoln, or other districts, I'd like to have the same kind of consideration as I intend to vote for this bill. Thank you.

SENATOR GOLL: Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President and members, I'd like to ask Senator Hall a question or two, if I may.

SENATOR HALL: Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Senator Hall, could you explain to me the three and a half, or three and five-tenths cents language on page six as opposed to the seven cent language on page nine in the current law, that we are raising now to ten? Now are we, in essence, saying that the current levy limit, at least to some degree, is 3.5 cents, but now we are going to raise it to 10 and sunset it back to 7? Is that what we are saying?

SENATOR HALL: No, Senator Vickers, my understanding is that the current maximum is 7, and we are raising it to 10 through LB 1012. The sunset would put it back to the 7 after tax year 1988.

SENATOR VICKERS: Well, what is the 3.5 cents then on page 6?

SENATOR HALL: Senator Vickers, I would say that that is an error. But if you would like, I would be happy to let you ask that same question of Senator Lynch. I think he could probably...

SENATOR VICKERS: Okay, Senator Lynch can answer it, that would be fine. Senator Lynch, could you answer that question? What is the 3.5 cents?
