

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay. State your point.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: This is not to extend the debate, but Senator DeCamp accused me of a misstatement, then he attributed something to me that I did not say. He said I claimed that they signed a letter telling the Attorney General to make determinations about land ownership. He does not listen well. I said they wrote the letter asking that he enforce Initiative 300. Then I asked Senator Rupp the question, if the Attorney General makes a determination that there are no operations in the state in violation of Initiative 300, of what value is this study? SPEAKER NICHOL: You've made your point. For what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR DEKAMP: Mr. President, I want to apologize if I misstated, or in the alternative, when we get the record of exactly what was said, and you all have it, you can all look at it, in the alternative if I happen to be right, and I suspect I am, I would ask for an apology. But to the degree that I may have misstated, I apologize. To the degree that you may turn out to be wrong, I would ask for a reciprocal apology.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The points are made. The question is the adoption of the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.
