

what they want to do with it, or I know what their purpose might be, I have to know that they will do it. The language that you skimmed over is found in line 6 where it says you know the knowledge will be unlawfully used. You don't know that. You don't know what the person you are teaching will do or do you feel there is some way that you have this actual knowledge of what a person is going to do?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Senator Chambers, you are looking at it as a man with a law degree. I am looking at it as a woman from a common sense standpoint. I would, in my own mind, think common sense tells me whomever is going to make this certainly, like I say, isn't making a Molotov cocktail in order to hand it to somebody to drink. So I guess unless you convince me on closing this amendment I will not be able to support. Thank you, Senator.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Beutler please, then Senator Chambers.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, to know is an interesting proposition and you can look at the word in many different senses. You can look at it in a metaphysical sense. You can look at it on a philosophic sense. You can look at it in a legal sense. Senator Chambers seems to be looking at it in some kind of philosophical or metaphysical sense. I am looking at it, I hope, in a legal sense. Sure, it is true in some sort of in the sense that we can't control the future, that you can never know for sure that somebody is going to do something that they say they are going to do. But, in a legal sense, if somebody comes to me as a teacher and says teach me to make a bomb because I want to go tomorrow at five o'clock and blow up Mayor Luedtke's office, if he says that, in a legal sense I say to you I know that he is going to use that information to cause a civil disorder tomorrow at five o'clock in Mayor Luedtke's office. That is the legal and that is the common sense answer to why "knows" should stay in the bill because you can know in a legal sense.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Chambers, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, Senator Beutler is usually a better arguer than he is this morning but he is on a weak bill and he knows it because he gave all the reasons himself why such a thing
