as you are not out there now. The meetings that you ought to be attending are those frequented by the farmers who indeed are desperate, who will become, as Senator Chizek suggested, victimized by these groups that are supposedly teaching hatred. Let's assume that there are such groups at work in Nebraska. Why will a farmer listen to them? Because all of the people in this Legislature and the other places who are supposed to be concerned about the farmer are never there where the farmer is but these other groups are. They will be in the Legislature. They will go to dinners at the Nebraska Club. They will have meetings in this Capitol when they talk about hearings on Initiative 300.

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Out there where the people are who have the problems, they will not show up but these other groups are there saying I will help you, I have a plan, I have the answer, and maybe there will be farmers speculating about these things and thinking about them and trying to find their way, and they will be saying the law enforcement couldn't be as bad as what these guys are telling me, but as they demonstrated in Kearney, these people's reputation goes before them, and this person will have been seen going to address this group of farmers, and that gives law enforcement the right and the power under this bill to break up that meeting. And do you know what happens then? The actions of the law enforcement officers have proved the point that these so-called hate spewers have indicated. These so-called hate teachers don't do anything. Law enforcement does it and I think you ought to begin to look seriously at this bill, and I am going to go through with a vote on this motion although I know there is no possibility of it being voted up.
