CLERK: (Read the record vote. See pages 761-62 of the Legislative Journal.) 5 ayes, 24 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: The motion fails. The amendment is not adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have is offered by Senator Chambers. (Read the Chambers amendment. See page 762 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I have to give a word or two of introduction to this particular amendment. The other day there was a bill before us, LB 626, which would have granted a permit to drive to certain people convicted of a first offense drunk driving. Around nine o'clock a number of members of the Legislature mentioned that that bill, they opposed it in the same way that I did. But they were not going to really get involved in the discussion and they didn't. But they didn't mind the discussion because they felt there were important issues that needed discussing. I felt there were important issues, but, unlike others, I discussed the issues that I thought were important on that bill and I am going to discuss the issues that I think are important on this bill in the same fashion and to the same extent that is allowed by the rules. Now, with that having been said, I invite your attention to Section 4 and Section 4 reads that Section 55-177, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, 1943, be amended to read as follows. Certain language is stricken and they insert a new penalty, and this is the penalty. "Any person violating Section 2 of this act shall be guilty of a Class IV felony." Now if you will look at the bill, or anybody who checks the record of this discussion, you will see that the only thing which Section 4, which is the penalty section, makes a crime, is Section 2. And what does Section 2 deal with? Teaching and assembling. You have heard all this yapping and yammering about civil disorders and the World Herald reporter yapped and yammered about it in writing. Yet the civil disorder is not a crime. It is
