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really resent them bringing in the anti-defamation league, B'Nai B'rith, because it puts every senator in the position of being damned if you do and damned if you don't. I will vote for the bracketing of the bill, maybe because more than anything else I think we need a cooling off period in here. I think too much has been written about racism. You know, they say the purpose of advertising is to keep something going and the more you talk about it, the more you encourage it. Name recognition.

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Senator Beutler, I would like to ask you a question, in all fairness to you, and I do mean this sincerely. In the World Herald Senator Chambers noted that Beutler has switched positions on the bill from opposition to support. Is that true?

SENATOR BEUTLER: What is true, Senator Higgins, is that when I was Chairman of the Judiciary Committee I objected to moving the bill out of committee because I wanted to find a better way of doing what they wanted to do. In the time that has elapsed since then I have not found a better way. In the time that has elapsed since then we have had a number of incidents relating to this kind of activity, including a murder in Rulo, and an unfortunate incident in Grand Island. My inability to find a better way to do it in conjunction with the increasing problem leads me to the conclusion that I should accept this way of doing it until I find a better way of doing it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Higgins, your time has expired.

SENATOR BEUTLER: If you want to call that a change of position, Senator Higgins, you can.

SENATOR HIGGINS: I did not, Senator Beutler, in fact, I let you speak on my time when I could have cut you off by just saying, give me a simple yes or no, but I allowed you that time.

PRESIDENT: Senator, your time has expired.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Higgins, I have no desire to get into a debate with you.
