

SPEAKER NICHOL: Yes.

SENATOR PAPPAS: You know if 3,000 is beaten down, because there is not a whole lot of difference between 3,000 and 3,500, I'm probably quite sure, even though Senator Lamb said a moment ago that is not his style, we'll probably look at 2,500, then 2,000, then 1,500, then 1,000, and 500. I might remind this body that we've had numerous talks the last two or three days about how many days we have left and we're running out of time. I might also remind this body that this isn't what you might call a major, significant bill to a lot of people. I think it is one that is needed for public safety. I think it is one that has been long overdue. But I may remind the body, too, if we are going to start doing this continuously on a daily basis, that somebody that does not like a piece of legislation or a particular bill is going to try to talk it to death, or spend so much time on it that there is going to be 49 separate days like this, and we don't have that many left, that we are going to be...somebody is going to file a ton of amendments on one particular piece of legislation. I'm opposed to 3,000. I'll be opposed to 2,500. I'll be opposed to 2,000, 1,500, 1,000, and 500.
