

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, only one statement that Senator Johnson that is in error. He said that everybody should be licensed, and this bill does not license everybody. It does not license everybody. So his philosophy of voting for the bill should be changed. I don't think that is a very good reason for Senator Johnson to change his mind because you are not going the whole way. If you are not going the whole way then there is something wrong with the bill. So I would suggest that we don't advance the bill, and let's just leave things the way they are. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Thank you. Senator Hefner, please.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, I still rise to oppose this bill. Senator Pappas handed...passed out a sheet from some magazine. It doesn't say what magazine it is. But it says, electrical service to many irrigation systems found faulty. This bill isn't going to correct them because everybody, under this bill, doesn't have to be licensed anyway. A person could still go out there and do his own work. Or if an electrician lived in the country he would be able to, if he didn't live in an incorporated area, he would be able to do this. Senator Higgins, you mentioned something about this article that was passed out. I guess at this time I'd like to ask Senator Pappas a question. What magazine did this come out of, Senator Pappas?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Pappas.

SENATOR PAPPAS: It's a... Farm Irrigation Age Equipment, April 1977 publication.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay, and where is this magazine published out of?

SENATOR PAPPAS: It's a similar publication like Farm Journal and stuff. It is probably published...I think St. Paul, Minnesota. It is a regional one, like The Nebraska Farmer, different things. They publish from different areas.
