PRESIDENT: The motion is the adoption of the Rupp amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. The motion is the adoption of the Rupp amendment to LB 43. Please record your vote. Members of the Legislature, please be informed that there is a motion on the floor on which you might wish to make a vote. The motion before us is the Rupp amendment to LB 43. Please record your vote. A great burst of objectivity, the Presiding Officer will have to hold this vote open. The Chair will allow 30 seconds for the recording of votes. The motion is...Senator Rupp.

SENATOR RUPP: Yes, I would just ask for a record vote, please.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. You have about 25 seconds to record your vote on the Rupp amendment to LB 43. Fifteen seconds...ten seconds to record your vote on the Rupp amendment to LB 43. Please record your vote if you wish to vote. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: (Read the record vote. See pages 834-35 of the Legislative Journal.) 14 ayes, 18 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion fails. What is next on the desk, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senators Warner and Landis would move to amend. Their amendment is on page 772 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I would move adoption of the amendment. What this does, it reflects the comment of those who are concerned about any adjustment now because of the economic times by having no change whatsoever commencing January 1 of '87. The adjustment would begin in January of 1988 and then be three times through 1990. The accumulative cost for the first year for the whole package would be 67,000; it is 88,000 the second year; 42,000 the third year, because of the adjustment that is proposed and then it would be 35,000 the fourth year, and there are four figures because you are dealing with four fiscal years although three calendar years for the adjustment.
