additional funds from other sources if they wish to, to supplement. So, there is a variety of management responses. There is no obligation for the school to accept that child if they don't want to, if there is no way to pay for it.

SENATOR CARSTEN: But if the school does accept that responsibility and believe the need is there and they don't have the money, is it not possible that at some future point they can come to the state for a request for those services?

SENATOR LANDIS: Schools could come to the state for any number of services. That's right.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Is there further discussion on the bill? If not, the motion is to advance LB 68. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. The Chair would take this opportunity to announce that Senator Wesely has seven guests in the north balcony from Lincoln. They are seven members of the Goodyear Top-Ten accompanied by their activities coordinator. We'd very much like to welcome you to the Legislature and if you'd stand, we'd like to recognize you. Also, the senator does not know that I'm going to announce this, but I would like to announce on behalf of all of you that on next Sunday, February 23, Senator Goodrich will be celebrating his 39th birthday.
