PRESIDENT: The motion is to reject the committee amendments. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. As they say out west, it's a funny motion, but go ahead.

SENATOR LANDIS: (Microphone not activated)...a green vote is a vote yes to reject. Is that right?

PRESIDENT: That's right.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to reject the amendments and Chairman Landis recommends that. He is advocating a green vote. It is not for me to suggest what color of vote you make. Have you all voted? Record the vote. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, I just want to note that there were 31 votes which is the highest total in recent history for that motion.

PRESIDENT: That's right. There should be more motions for rejection. You probably would find that outdistanced. Oh, I shouldn't have said that. The committee amendments have been adopted...have been rejected. We have an amendment to the bill now.

PRESIDENT: Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President and members, the amendment that I would offer to this bill is a bill (sic), just so that you know, it is a bill (sic) that Senator Harris and I presented to the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee yesterday.
