it was because we wanted consistency across the state relative to that sort of designation and rather than to leave it up to the individual managers. I'm sure there will be discussion and conversation between them, but there will be a brand new consistency we would not have if we allowed it to be an individual local decision.

I'd just say that there are a lot of questions I think a lot of us have who did not sit on the Public Works Committee and hear this bill, so hopefully maybe we could all get together and maybe go through this bill more carefully because it does, I think, have significant impact upon the state, upon production agriculture in general and I guess that's where my concerns may come from, but I do see a need for us to protect the ground water quality and we have been trying to do that in the last...at least this last year and so I would strongly urge the...I suppose any member who has a concern with this issue to really seriously read the bill and consider the ramifications of the bill itself as it may affect the different elements of our society. As I said, I'm going to take a more in depth look at it between now and Select File.
