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common on many of the bills that we have voted and worked for together. But what I am saying is this is not the first time this session that this body is considering doing something against our own rule book. The only difference is this time we are attempting to do it legitimately with a motion to suspend the rules. If that doesn't run, then we are being legal, but what we have done in the past, or what the Executive Board has done in the past was not. They did not follow the rules, and for that reason I will support this motion to suspend the rules because, at least, it is within the rule book. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Thank you. Senator Miller, then Senator Hall.

SENATOR MILLER: I do not think that this body should suspend the rules. It is not necessary. It is taking time. We have a capable lady in a position to assume the responsibility. And I would like to emphasize that she has been serving the Legislature longer than any other woman in this institution, if you can call this an institution. And she has...was the first lady to serve. She served by herself for four years, the only woman in this body. This is not a necessary rules change. Cal Carsten would be a very capable leader. He knows what this body thinks of him, and this is not a necessary rules change.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Hall, please.

SENATOR HALL: Question.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Debate has ceased. Senator Labeledz, would you like to close on your motion to suspend.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I certainly would. I'll be very brief though because I didn't think it would take this much time. I agree wholeheartedly of the beautiful, wonderful, nice things that some of the senators said about Senator Marsh. I would say the same thing,
