

earthquakes and volcanic eruptions. So if a person is teaching those types of items and his or her intent is that people use this kind of technology, no matter how crackbrained it might be to somebody else for the purpose of being used in a civil disorder, that kind of speech is a Class IV felony, that is preposterous. There is no need that the speaker be taken seriously. The room could be filled with scoffers, mockers, those who laugh, even reporters, but because the speaker's intent is that the words be used to push for activities that will be used in civil disorder, a Class IV felony results. There is no need that the information be accurate. I can tell people in here that I am going to demonstrate how to make a bomb. And as Richard Pryor indicated, I can take homogenized milk and skim milk and a cookie and tell them, if you put these three together in a container, they will blow up the Capitol Building and that is what I want you to do with this. And my intent makes that wrong even though it is crackbrained and crazy. I could tell how to make a hydrogen bomb and the information could be totally in error, totally inaccurate, nobody listening could carry it out. But because my intent was that what I say be used for this purpose, I have committed a Class IV felony. And with that kind of preposterous nonsense in the bill, Senator Hoagland has the nerve to say that if a person by means of a written medium presents information that is accurate, that is capable of being used to make weapons, that is designed to incite, the fact that it is written should cease...should cause it to cease being the kind of action that this speech under LB 772 will be considered. This is a preposterous bill and he is right, I am trying to make a point. I am trying to make a point so clear that when this thing comes back to haunt members of the Legislature, none of them can say these issues were not raised or that they didn't know.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON PRESIDING

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: You have one minute, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I want to see those who run for office, when this matter is brought to them, scramble and tap dance like a drop of water on a hot griddle to point out that they didn't really mean for the bill to do what it is doing. You will notice Senator Hoagland said, those of you who support the concept, not the specifics of the bill. Everybody can support the concept of outlawing or doing away with activity
