

point that the bill really goes beyond things that we like to do because it deals in page 3, and you can read right with me, I wish you would take the time to read it. Section 2, I guess it would be, or the item marked number two, that deals strictly with what is in the mind, the intent of an individual in doing a specific thing. And it forbids that person to learn something or assemble with other people if they have this bad intent sometime in the future. Now, let's use an example, and, Senator Hoagland, address it, please, and tell me I am wrong. I hope I am wrong. Senator Chambers, listen. Let's assume I am 19 years old. No, make me 22 years old. I have been through college. I am convinced there are a lot of injustices in society. I am convinced that society needs to be changed. The establishment has control. There is a bad war going on. Call it, Vietnam, or whatever. And I determine I am going to take the time to go to law school so I can learn how to fight the society on the streets and in the ramparts and wherever. My intent is civil disobedience and the best techniques to learn to engage in it from a legal standpoint and from every other way. That is my intent in going to law school. We made that a crime under this bill. Far-fetched...

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: One minute, Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: ...not really. That's what is in the bill. So, as I say, the concept, there isn't anybody would disagree with. The mechanics, I think a whole bunch of us disagree with. I have an amendment that tries to improve it. Senator Chambers has amendments that go the opposite direction and try to illustrate how bad it is. Who is right, I don't know. I faced up to this fact. I don't think I can stop the bill so I will probably try to improve it but I am not going to tell you that I believe the bill as it sits is a good bill and I am not sure how well it can be improved. I do believe this section which deals so intimately with what is in the mind goes beyond anything that we want to be playing with in our criminal laws. I would ask you to seriously consider maybe changing that section further on. If we start criminalizing...

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Time, Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: ...what is in the mind of an individual and then trying to guess what is in that mind, we are playing on
