

Mr. President.

SENATOR LAMB: The house is under call. All unauthorized personnel, please leave the floor. All senators, please record your presence. Senator Haberman, do you wish to authorize call ins for this cease debate?

SENATOR HABERMAN: (Response inaudible.)

SENATOR LAMB: Call ins are authorized.

CLERK: Senator DeCamp voting yes. Senator Sieck voting yes. Senator Lynch voting yes. Senator Rupp...you had voted yes, Senator. Senator Harris voting yes. Senator Hartnett voting yes. Senator Beyer voting yes. Senator Chizek voting yes. Senator Chronister voting yes. Senator Lowell Johnson voting yes. Senator Carsten voting yes.

SENATOR LAMB: Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SENATOR LAMB: Debate has ceased. Senator Hannibal to close on his amendment.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, the amendment becomes the bill now because we are striking the original sections. We are rewriting the bill and adding the amendment having the limits from...placed on the employees as well at 1 million and 5 million, just like the political subdivisions are as of LB 14 of last year. So, I guess I don't want to belabor the point of the bill. What it is doing is bringing the time limit in for suing or filing claim against an employee of a political subdivision to within the one year time period, one year from the date the damage occurs, to file a claim against a political subdivision. And those limits for liability will be in line with the political subdivisions of 1 million and 5 million. I would move for the advancement of the amendment.

SENATOR LAMB: I believe, Senator, the motion is the adoption of your amendment to the bill. That is the motion. Those in support vote aye, those opposed vote no. Twenty-five votes required. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.
