

issued after July 1 of '86 and that's because they do not wish to be overwhelmed with a backlog of outstanding traffic citations and that's very reasonable. So, that's the first part of this amendment. And, in addition, you know Senator Vickers put a 20-day, just put in a 20-day requirement. This amendment also puts in another 20-day requirement, so the total time that people will really have to get their act together in terms of dealing with their traffic citations will be 40 days. Simple amendment, not technical, is substantive, but good policy. Ask its adoption.

PRESIDENT: Anyone else wish to speak on the Johnson amendment? Anyone else to speak on the Johnson amendment? All those in favor of the amendment vote aye, opposed nay. The motion is the adoption of an amendment offered by Senator Vard Johnson to LB 153. Please record your vote. Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hefner would move to amend the bill.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, I apologize that I was not ready to handle this amendment. I believe I introduced it last year and it's in last year's Journal and this was brought to me by a constituent. He has a 14-year-old boy and he cannot use his school permit to drive from one farm to another when he is doing chores. And so what this would do, it says, "If such person is employed or lives on a farm to and from the farm where he or she is employed or between sections of farmland where he or she lives or is employed by the nearest highway or street." So this would permit this young chap to drive from one farm to another or get a permit to do this. Now, the way they handle it, he or she has to drive a tractor. This would permit them to drive a pickup or a car or get a permit to drive a car. It would be something like the school permit and so with that, I would urge the adoption of this amendment.
