

SENATOR CARSTEN: One minute.

SENATOR WARNER: ...than is anticipated at this time. The bill covers all the things that are a factor in trying to bring about coordination and trying to plan for long term educational policy. It is all spelled out, but I also believe that it will be extremely expensive and won't have the power to enforce it. And, for that reason, I would prefer, if we are going to make that kind of a change, which I have not supported the super boards either, but if you are going to do anything, that would make more sense to me than this approach. And I am sure it is a basic difference, philosophical difference, perhaps, that I would have with Senator Vickers, but I did want to explain why I feel I must vote no.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator Vickers, would you care to close, please.

Here is Senator Goodrich. There are, I believe, nine excused, Senator Vickers.
