PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR SIECK: ...because we are going to have to take a look at it, and we have asked the Revenue Department to really take a look at this. What are we going to lose in the State of Nebraska because of exemptions in other states? And you will find that we are going to lose a tremendous amount of business, but if we exempt this, it is a \$30 million tax bill that we are going to have to find someplace else. Oh, yes, the other subject was 271. Do you know that many of the urban senators feel that we are being exempted quite a bit? I can assure you every business that we have out there in agriculture, if we build a big hog complex, or if we build a cattle complex, we are paying a 100 percent value on that. It isn't reduced whatsoever. We are also, on our home, that value on your home is the same as the value in town. You may have a street by it and you are paying extra for that, but other than that, that building is the same as your building here in town. So we are paying the same amount of taxes as anybody else. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Sieck. Next speaker, Senator Miller.

SENATOR MILLER: Call the question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called. We have not had exactly the even debate yet but do I see five hands? I will put the question to you. Shall the debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. The motion is, shall the debate now close, the question is. The Chair will allow 30 seconds for the recording of your votes. The question has been called and the question is, shall the debate now close? Fifteen seconds to record your vote. Five seconds to record your vote. The question is, shall the debate now close? Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 10 ayes, 16 nays to cease debate.

PRESIDENT: The motion fails. The next speaker is Senator Hoagland.
