

CLERK: I have others.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Okay.

CLERK: Mr. President, then the next amendment I have is by Senator Wesely.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator Wesely, are you within the sound of my voice? You have an amendment on 219. Let's pass over that one then, Mr. Clerk. I...

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Withem would move to amend the bill.

SENATOR WITHEM: Mr. Chairman...

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator Withem.

SENATOR WITHEM: ...I just filed that, I will wait until Select File on that. I would like to have it printed though.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Okay, do you have anything more?

CLERK: No, sir, just Senator Wesely's amendment. That is the only thing I have on the bill.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Well, we will pass over that one and we will, since Senator Wesely is not here, pass over that one and we will go back to the bill. On the bill, Senator Miller, I think you were the next in line.

SENATOR MILLER: We have to consider what fair taxation is here, I have heard that mentioned several times. And fair taxation, I think we should approach it from another angle and that is to what each individual pays in fair taxation also. We recognize that we have had a...if you look at the statistics, for example, that we looked at when we were passing LB 662, you could see that the individual person in agriculture paid a much larger per household, per individual share of education than an urban resident. Now, I chose to support LB 662 because I believe in fair taxation and fair taxation can be looked at from two angles, one is from the individual household or the other is from each individual entity in society, either agriculture or nonagriculture.
