

SENATOR CHRONISTER: Mr. President, I call the previous question.

SENATOR CARSTEN: The question has been called for. Do I see five hands? I do. All those in favor of ceasing debate will vote aye, those opposed will vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Mr. President.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Debate has ceased. Senator Hartnett, would you close on your amendment, please.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I simply want to reiterate the statements that were made by Senator Lamb and Senator Schmit that what I am really proposing to do, because we are going to have two legislative sessions before this comes up, before districts can opt out, is that we need to have a real meaningful study out of this, so that we really have to get people to talk about this issue and we can see what ESUs have done. They have grown over the years. They are spending over \$10.5 million of our property tax and we simply should help and have people, local boards of education, which have to fund it, have the idea of what goes on as far as education in a community, should have a right to say yes or no as far as being as part of an ESU, and so if...I also agree with the remarks of Senator Lamb that maybe the way to go is maybe just the 1 percent but I think this maybe will get ESUs to the bargaining table. I don't think up to this time they have been there. So I think that is the purpose of my amendment and I would appreciate a vote for advancement of this amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Senator Hartnett was closing. We are now voting on the Hartnett amendment to the Vickers amendment. All those in favor will vote aye, those opposed will vote no. Have you all voted? Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Could we have a call of the house and a roll call vote, please.

SENATOR CARSTEN: A call of the house has been requested. All those in favor of going under call vote aye, those
