

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Well, pretty much.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Senator Haberman, that provision is already in another section of the statute, and that language is clarifying language.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So you are telling us that there will be no increase in any financial need on this bill.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: No, and you've got a letter from Mr. Keller in front of you stating that. (Inaudible due to interruption.)

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well, yes, I got the letter, but I wanted you to say it and put it in the record. Thank you, Senator Hoagland. I'll appoint your...I will support your amendment.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Thank you, Senator Haberman. Senator Schmit is up next. Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: I'll wait until we see whether the motion to return is successful, Mr. President.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Oh, Senator Schmit has decided to pass. All right. Then we'll have Senator Lamb up.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members, Senator Hannibal here suggested, Senator Johnson, Senator Hannibal suggested if you don't like an unruly body maybe you should comb your hair. (Laughter.)
