SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to maybe go into debt to obtain money to come down to this Legislature and if he read his Lincoln papers yesterday he would see where a number of the Indians had been told by various senators that there is no need in pushing for these programs because they are irreparably damaged, they are doomed and they will not be allowed to survive. So some of the senators in talking to these groups have discouraged them. I hope that you will vote to indefinitely postpone this bill pursuant to Senator Hall's very good motion.

May I remind you that a simple majority will be sufficient for this motion on General File. The motion is to indefinitely postpone LB 1089. If members wish to record their vote, please do so.
