

PRESIDENT: Call of the house has been requested. The question is, shall the house come under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 19 ayes, 0 nays to go under call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion carried. The house is under call. All members in the Legislature, please turn on your presence light. Look up to the front and see that your green light is on. Members outside the Chamber, please return to the Chamber, the house is under call. Just a moment, Senator Warner. Unauthorized personnel should be off the floor. Members should be in your seats. If offices of the senators are within hearing of my voice, please encourage the senators to return to the Legislative Chamber. Senator Warner, do you wish to proceed while we are under call or while we are getting our call?

SENATOR WARNER: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Go ahead.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, as I listened to the debate, discussion...

PRESIDENT: (Gavel). Go ahead, Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: ...it would appear that primarily we are dealing with the issue of perception of what this override is perceived to be because the issue does not seem to be one of whether or not to fund it. It is only a matter of when. And if that is the only question, then it ought to be done today, because the perception is going to be if it is not done today, I think the perception in many people's minds notwithstanding the fact that no one who currently receives the exemption is going to be directly adversely affected but rather property owners as a whole within a governmental subdivision will be adversely affected, but the perception will be that somehow or other we are not living up to the provisions of the statute that was enacted in 1984. All of us agree that at least part if not all of the provisions proposed in the Governor's bill will be beneficial, that portion that deals only with the 90/10 percent split between state and governmental subdivisions is not a limitation, of course, it merely means that next year's cost for every dollar it goes up the state pays 90 cents.
