

other things that may be looked at and I assume that some of those may be over the summer, but that is a separate issue. The issue today to me is solely one of perception that whether or not this body is willing to provide the funding to reimburse local governments for the reduced revenue that was required by the passage of the legislation two years ago. And I would urge that you vote for the override and certainly it is my understanding, as I am sure...as it is many of you have so stated that we will continue to be supportive of those measures which can reduce future impact from this concept on the local government in other legislation. But today I believe it is right to vote for the override to keep faith with the legislation that was enacted in 1984.

PRESIDENT: Senator Landis, would you check your presence light? All right, clear the board, we are ready to go for the vote. The motion is...the question is, shall LB 839 become law notwithstanding the objection of the Governor? A yes vote will be a vote to override and a no vote will be a vote to sustain the veto. All those in favor of the motion...of the question, shall 839 become law, vote aye, opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Please record your vote if you wish to vote. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote. The call of the house is raised.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 1675-76 of the Legislative Journal.) 38 ayes, 10 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to override the Governor's line-item veto.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. The veto is overridden. LB 839 is declared law. Do you have matters for the record, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Yes, sir.

PRESIDENT: We will proceed to Final Reading for a little bit since we have you all here.
