SENATOR SMITH: I'll withdraw those amendments then at this time.

PRESIDENT: And you have to offer a substitution.

SENATOR SMITH: All right, I withdraw then for a substitution which will follow Senator DeCamp's.

CLERK: Oh, okay.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp would move to amend the bill.

CLERK: Mr. President, I might add just so the members know, the amendment will be in your bill book. It is 2536.
