

Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. Senator Smith, you may close.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to just close by responding to a couple of the comments that were made regarding the amendment and I guess I have to stand here and support my "nothing" amendment, Senator Abboud. I think that this amendment does do something irregardless of the fact that you say it does not. It addresses, to me, the one area of total deregulation in this bill. That's important to me and that's the reason I felt that it needed to be addressed. The second thing that I would like to say is I believe, Senator Lamb, and I could be wrong on this, if so, I think I'm going to relinquish a little time to Senator DeCamp to maybe do a little more explanation about the bill, but, Senator Lamb, it's my understanding the reason that we have the sunset date, if you want to call it that, of 1991 is because this is for a five year period throughout the bill. That's the idea of the thing, the process of what they're doing in the bill itself and that's why I think it ties back to that. Now I may be wrong on that my own self, so I'll ask Senator DeCamp if he would respond to that. Finally, I would just conclude by asking for the movement, or the adoption of my amendment to the DeCamp amendment, but first of all, let Senator DeCamp respond.

SENATOR DECAMP: Just to address Senator Landis's concern, I have learned that the very thing he is concerned about is already the exact rule and regulation policy of the PSC. It was copied from there relative to the liability question and it has nothing to do with cars hitting little boys. It has to do with forgetting names in telephone books.

PRESIDENT: The motion is the adoption...are you through, Senator Smith?

SENATOR SMITH: No, I asked Senator DeCamp to respond to Senator Lamb's concern.

PRESIDENT: Yes.
