SENATOR LAMB: I'm not going to make any commitments on that, Senator. I think this is an improvement to the bill. I think it is still not totally a good bill. I would reserve my right to take any position on any amendments, or the bill.

SENATOR DECAMP: Well,...

PRESIDENT: One minute left of Senator Lamb's time.

SENATOR DECAMP: I'm going to vote for your 10 percent, and I'm going to try to oppose vigorously the other portion because I believe it is counterproductive to our rural areas more than anything. And the 10 percent I feel will not be that big a handicap because ultimately it is the cost of service that is involved. And, with that understanding, I would hope that then you might drop the other half of your amendment.

PRESIDENT: The motion is the adoption of the Lamb amendment to the DeCamp amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Please record your vote. Simple majority rules. Anyone who wishes to vote, please do so. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 24 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Lamb's first amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Lamb would move to amend the DeCamp amendment. (Second Lamb amendment appears on page 1696 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: We're on the second...

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members, this is the other half of the amendment which was divided, and I'll pursue this. I'll pursue this because after 1991 this whole section would terminate, would terminate. That is the section...subsection 7, which contains the 10 percent, it contains the 10 percent provision whereby the commission can then get involved. I don't know what is going to happen
