

your executives as perks or bonuses, you are still guaranteed that you are going to get a 10 percent increase on that billing, at least through 1991. After that they can increase it whatever they choose to. Now as I stated previously, the responsibility of the directors of a phone company are not to the ratepayers. The responsibility is to that stockholder, to increase the profits as much as possible without the ratepayers going through the roof. Now you have a situation where the Public Service Commission has been able to look at the situation, and they've been acting as an insulator, and they have said, well, you can increase it over this particular amount. If we adopt the DeCamp amendment, we are guaranteeing an increase in profit for those phone companies, or an increase in their rates to the ratepayers, and in the future even higher rates. With that, I urge the rejection of the DeCamp amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Let's have a roll call vote, Mr. President. I want to go on record here.
