

SENATOR HARRIS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this appropriation is one that I wish we could do more often. It is an appropriation, a very small amount, \$11,661, but the catch to this one is that it will be paid back to the state as the various entities will be billed for the services that will be rendered by LB 311A which, if you recall, is a system of advising people that are contemplating retirement and giving them their options. So it has a cost, a very low cost that will be repaid in the final analysis. I move that LB 311A be advanced. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Further discussion? The motion is to advance to E & R initial. All those in favor of advancing 311A vote aye, opposed vote nay. Have to take a machine vote. Vote aye or nay. Please record your vote on advancement from General File of LB 311A. Please record your vote. The motion is to advance LB 311A to initial enrollment and review. Please record your vote. We need the cooperation, obviously, of all members on the floor. Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance LB 311A.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. Next, LB 775A.

CLERK: Mr. President, 775A by Senator Rogers being offered by Senator Rod Johnson appropriates funds for LB 775.

PRESIDENT: Senator Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Mr. President, members, Senator Rogers asked me to take this A bill for him since he is in a hearing this afternoon. Under LB 775 we create the Nebraska Pseudorabies Control Act and because of that, if that bill should pass, there will be some expense. The testing procedures of the swine would be done by existing personnel in the Department of Ag, but yet we do need someone to coordinate the program and that will call for one clerical person as well as operating and travel expenses for the implementation of this issue and all told it will cost about \$29,000 for next fiscal year. There will be financial impact this fiscal year on the budget, but there will be a \$29,000 impact to the budget in July 1, 1987. So we do need to implement the bill. The testing fees will be paid for by the pork producers that have their herds tested by the Department of Agriculture officials. I would move for the advancement of the bill.
