

increase, (d) a list of subscribers who are affected by the proposed rate increase, (e) the effective date of the rate increase, and (f) the dates, times, and places for the public hearings required by this subsection. A telecommunications company which proposes to increase its basic local exchange rates shall hold at least two public hearings within the affected local exchange area prior to the effective date of the rate increase." Merely a method by which the local people understand that there is a rate increase coming, also explains the method by which they can petition the Public Service Commission to get involved. I ask the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, if there is anything I can do to accommodate Senator Lamb, I would. I want to ask him a question.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, sir.

SENATOR DECAMP: Let me ask you a question. When you say the names of the subscribers, that works if you have got 100 subscribers. I don't know if it works if you got...

SENATOR LAMB: No, I don't mean the actual names.

SENATOR DECAMP: Okay, that is all I wanted to know. Mr. President, without consulting any phone company, and strictly on my own recognizance, I think I will support this amendment, and if there are heart attacks occurring a hundred feet behind me, fine. I believe it is reasonable to give notice of times and dates and to have some public hearings. I am all for that because I believe the more informed Nebraskans become on this whole telephone picture which is an obligation of the phone companies as much as anybody, the more it will work out over the next reasonable period of time. There needs to be education and information and Senator Lamb's amendment I think will help cause it to occur, and when he says a list of subscribers, he has identified specifically that he doesn't mean the names. I assume he means the subscribers in these exchanges such as Anselmo and Atkinson, and so on and so forth, is that correct, Senator Lamb?
