CLERK: 16 ayes, 0 nays to go under call, Mr. President.

SENATOR CARSTEN: The house is under call. Those of you in the Chamber, please press your green button. Those outside the Chamber, please return and register your presence, please. Senator Baack, Senator Chambers, Senator Chronister, Senator Hall, Senator Goll, Senator Lynch, no, we have got you. Senator Wesely, Senator Warner, Senator Remmers, will you push your button, please. Senator Rogers. Senator Rupp. Senator Rupp, are you within the sound of my voice? Senator Scofield, we are short Senator Rupp, I believe, is the only one. Shall we proceed?

SENATOR SCOFIELD: Let's go.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Call the roll.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 1780-81 of the Legislative Journal.) 23 ayes, 23 nays, Mr. President.

SENATOR CARSTEN: The motion fails. Do you have anything further on the bill?

CLERK: Nothing further at this time, Mr. President.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator DeCamp, do you want to move the bill?

SENATOR DECAMP: I move the bill be advanced.
