

moving which is already moving. But it takes even more to stop that which is moving and turn it in a different direction. Since the dean brought these things to my attention, I don't believe I'm going to pursue this amendment. He had indicated that some students who have already applied to this school are concerned as to whether or not the school will be in operation for the full period of time that it will take them to finish their legal education. But before I withdraw that amendment there is a comment I want to make and it touches on the concepts begin a society having a death penalty. It is unthinkable that certain individuals would wind up being subject to the death penalty if they are politically powerful, if they have a lot of money, or if they are socially prominent. By the same token it is unthinkable that certain institutions in this society could be marked for extinction, such as a law school. People may talk about upgrading the faculty, broadening the curriculum, expanding the library, but to even think of abolishing the law school is something that does not occur. Not only do I think it, I feel it may be a very valid and appropriate thing to do. But since this is late in the session, and I'm attempting to do it by means of an amendment, without giving the law school people the opportunity to present their case, and an opportunity to hear from the public so that they can tell how much they love lawyers, how much they trust judges, how the society would fall to pieces if anything were done to affect, in a radical way, the legal system, I'm going to ask that I be allowed to withdraw that amendment. But if anybody insists on us considering it it won't hurt my feelings, but if there is not such a person then I am asking unanimous consent to withdraw it.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: The amendment is withdrawn. Before we go any further, Mr. Clerk, I would like to recognize that Senator Smith has a guest in the audience, Mr. Clayton Lukow from Holstein, Nebraska. If you'd rise, sir, we'd like to welcome you to the Legislature. Further amendment, Mr. Clerk.
