SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Yes, I would be glad to answer that, Senator Nelson. This is all industrial gases for all industries in our state and that is why it is a \$700,000 price tag. The price tag for Nucor is \$40,000.

SENATOR NELSON: Wow, \$700,000, there goes my machinery tax, all the other little goodies. Thanks.
