CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See page 1946 of the Legislative Journal.) 20 ayes, 14 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The motion fails. Senator Haberman, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, I move to adjourn until eight o'clock tomorrow morning.

SPEAKER NICHOL: You have heard the motion. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 8 ayes, 19 nays to adjourn.

SPEAKER NICHOL: We stay in session.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have is by Senators DeCamp, Marsh, Pirsch, Chizek, and Goodrich. It is found on page 1897.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Vard Johnson, are you going to handle that? Oh, Senator Hannibal. Oh, yes, I was asking, who is going to handle the amendment? Senator Pirsch. The call is raised.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. You caught me unaware and I thought there were a lot of amendments before this. If you will turn to page 1897, the amendment is included in the exemptions which are allowed to or which includes exemptions to the PTAs, schools, and the like. Presently meals for human consumption are exempted from the sales tax and this was brought to me by a principal of a school who asked me what we did last year to change the sales tax on her school pencils. And I told her that I didn't think we did anything. I checked into it and found that while we do exempt the sales tax on meals sponsored by the PTA and the school organizations, that there is a lot of confusion about whether they also were exempted from those school pencils, school spirit T-shirts and school buttons.
