We are talking about something that is new to the State of Nebraska. Nebraska is one of the main thoroughfares of the nation for railroads and there is a lot of hazardous material that goes through this state, there are a lot of crossings that go through this state. I think that we need time, we need time for the FRA to study, FRA to come up with regulations for cabooseless trains, which they haven't yet, I think we need time for the public to adjust. I'd ask you very much so to adopt this motion and I would ask for a roll call vote, straight order.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is the adoption of the Pappas amendment. Roll call vote, Mr. Clerk, in reverse order. Senator Pappas wants it straight. Shall we vote on whether we take it in reverse or take it straight. Do it straight.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. Vote appears on pages 1983-84 of the Legislative Journal.) 20 ayes, 25 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The motion fails. Do you have anything else on it?

CLERK: Mr. President, I don't believe I have anything further on Senator Hannibal's amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Hannibal, on your amendments.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Mr. Speaker, I guess I will just...is this closing, Mr. Speaker? Mr. Speaker, is this closing on the amendment?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Yes, it is. No, no, we are just back to it. We just declined the last amendment so we are starting on your amendment.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Are there any lights on?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Yes, one.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: All right, then I will just wait.
