LB 153, 701, 1229

SPEAKER NICHOL: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 701 pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: (Record vote read. See page 2048 of the Legislative Journal.) 45 ayes, 0 nays, 3 present and not voting, 1 excused and not voting, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: LB 701 passes. The next bill is LB 1229, and the Clerk reminds me it does have the emergency clause on it.

CLERK: (Read LB 1229 on Final Reading.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 1229 pass with the emergency clause attached? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: (Record vote read. See pages 2048-49 of the Legislative Journal.) 46 ayes, 0 nays, 2 present and not voting, 1 excused and not voting, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: LB 1229 passes with the emergency clause attached. LB 153.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a motion on the desk. Senator Haberman would move to return 153 to Select File for specific amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Haberman, please.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, the amendment has two parts. One is that instead of a year suspension, it is six months, if you refuse to take the test. The second part is that we changed the bill, on third offenders it used to be a life sentence. If you were convicted, you lost your license for life. The bill says ten years. The amendment says fifteen. I got to thinking about it and I got to adding up ages and ten years and one thing and another. I thought fifteen years would be a fairer amount to suspend it instead of life. So I ask to return the bill for those two specific amendments.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Any further discussion on the bill? The
