SENATOR HIGGINS: Okay. Does it say shall or may?

SENATOR WESELY: I think it's shall. They are responsible for administering it, plus there is another feature that we added to the bill with that amendment that says there is public disclosure of who is getting the credit for what purpose so that there is public disclosure for the first time on this sort of credit which is a chance for a check and balance as well from the public.

SENATOR HIGGINS: So if I open a new business and I get the \$100,000 through another bill that we're passing this year and I employ two people, that will give me \$1,000 tax credit plus I will have used the state to start the business. Sounds like a sweet deal to me. I think I'll...I think I'll...we do have a bill that does just that. I think they call it the entrepreneurship, so if I start a new business I can go to the state and I can get \$100,000 and then the employees I hire I can get a \$500 tax credit on each one of them, my God, I can be in the class of a millionaire and pay no taxes at all and be using the state's money and everything else. Thank you, Senator, you've answered my questions.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Nelson, did you have...?

SENATOR NELSON: Mr. President, yes, I will make this very quick. Senator Wesely, I'll say for example, a feed yard would expand another 80 acres and add ten more employees to take advantage of tax deductions and so on and so forth, maybe in that expansion, would this also apply to them?

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, I think Senator Vickers amended the bill on General File so that would be included. It wasn't under the original bill.

SENATOR NELSON: I think that was where we had feeding livestock and then raising calves or something, livestock was added into it I think. Okay.

SENATOR WESELY: Yeah.
