

this vote is not satisfactory. The vote is not finished yet. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? If you wish to vote aye or nay on the Hoagland-Eret amendment, please do so. Have you all voted? Record the vote. Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I would ask for a roll call on this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Very well. Roll call vote has been requested.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 2136-37 of the Legislative Journal.) 17 ayes, 20 nays.

PRESIDENT: The amendment fails. Anything else on the bill?

CLERK: Yes, sir, there is. Mr. President, the next amendment I have is by Senator Lynch.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Mr. President and members, this is a technical little amendment that would simply say, if you will look at the first page of the bill on line 6, it says if agricultural land as described in Sections, and the numbers, is involved, right after that it would go on to read "or property which is used for a trade or business or provided financing for a trade or business." And that would apply on four or five other occasions throughout the bill where that same language appeared. The only reason I offered this to you is I think this is a good chance for the Center for Rural Affairs to become the Center for Rural and Urban Affairs and I think everybody that is in business, whether they are a farmer or in the city has problems and would like to maintain and keep their homestead maybe should be treated equally. Real quickly, in the City of Omaha in '80, there were 2800 people who filed for Chapter 11, 7, and 13 because of problems they faced as well. So far in Omaha alone, I am not sure across the country in all the cities that may exist how many numbers there are, but 957 people to date have filed for Chapter 11, 7, or 13. So I would simply ask your, without going into detail, the same privilege whatever technically that might be because with all of the discussion we have had so far on this bill, you may know even better than I what benefits if any exist out there for those people who have a farm and a homestead that are both mortgaged together and want to have some way to maintain that homestead the same as the person in the city who has a business, who has his home attached
