

to that business, and has to go through the same procedure and problem. So I would simply ask for your approval of this amendment so that those who exist in the city in these trying economic times will be given the same kind of benefit from this legislation as will those in the country.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hoagland, on the Lynch amendment.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Yes, I would rise in opposition to Senator Lynch's amendment, ladies and gentlemen, and a copy has been passed out, not because I don't sympathize with the purpose of what he is trying to do and not because I don't think that the partial redemption and notice to cure provision shouldn't apply to urban property as well but because it goes beyond the scope of this bill. Now this bill pertains to agricultural land. It has been negotiated with the Nebraska Banking Association and with savings and loan representatives and others on the basis that it applies to agricultural land. Those have been the understandings that have come with the bill as it has proceeded this far. It was strictly an agricultural land bill when we heard it in the Judiciary Committee, and to now apply it to urban property to bring in urban deeds of trust, which I know is an issue of concern to Senator Goodrich, is really going to blow the bill wide open and probably ultimately apart. I doubt if we can hold support for the bill if we make it this broad. That is the reason I am opposing it, not because I don't think what Senator Lynch is trying to do is incorrect on the merits but because I would like to try and save what we have got. So I plead to you, let's keep the bill in its current form and reject an attempt to expand it beyond agricultural land. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, at this point I have to quote the sage of the Legislature, the renowned Senator Howard Lamb, who was being interviewed in connection with what may have been done by the Legislature for agriculture. Senator Lamb said words to the effect your article can be very brief, the answer is nothing. We will often say since the entire problem cannot be solved, don't do anything at all. Everybody on the floor of this Legislature knows that this bill is not designed to solve the problems in the cities and that, indeed, it cannot, that although people are facing circumstances which seem on the surface to be the same, are really radically different.
