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previous obligations for April 16th would just have to go on the back burner. I hope the rest of you would agree.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Thank you. Senator Scofield, then Senator Rogers.

SENATOR SCOFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Hannibal, I guess, with his question just answered the procedural questions I have. With that I would simply echo a point that Senator Warner made earlier, and that is the need to really examine what the impact of particular cutting measures might be. And I simply would agree with also Senator Hannibal on his points that we need to do this deliberately and, heaven knows, if anybody wants out of this place and head west as fast as you can, it is me. But I will stick around if we can do this right and do what is in the best interest of the state, and, hopefully, avoid coming back at some later date this year if we don't do it right this time. So I think this is a good suggestion and I commend you for bringing it to us.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Thank you. Senator Rogers, then Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR ROGERS: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, being one of the members of the new class down here, I echo the thoughts of you. I'd like to have that extra day to study some of these things over. When I ran for this job I don't think I figured I'd be out of here on any given date, and I think when any of us are elected we should realize that something like this should come up. So I thoroughly endorse the idea of the Speaker.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Thank you. Senator Hoagland, then Senator Harris.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I would also support, Mr. Speaker, the extension of time. I think we could all use more time to understand the issues better. In the end, we'll wind up doing a better job if we have an extra day to try and work out the differences with the Governor's office. To have a clearer understanding, ourselves, of what we are doing I think it makes sense. So I will support it also.
