Governor, under the north balcony, Roger John Carrick, the British Consul General. We welcome you to our Unicameral and we hope you have a nice day here visiting. Thank you, Governor. Senator Lamb and then Senator Smith on the Johnson amendment, please.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President and members, I rise to oppose the Senator Rod Johnson amendment. I don't think we are ready to go completely to the central filing system at this point. Direct notification is here. It is what we are used to and what is working at this point. That does not mean that central filing system cannot be kept, cannot be used as additional information but to rely on the central filing system completely I think is a bit ahead of its time and so at this point I would oppose the Rod Johnson amendment and suggest that the bill be read in its present form.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Thank you, Senator Lamb. Senator Smith and then Senator Vickers.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to ask a few questions and I don't know whether I should ask them of Senator Johnson since this is his amendment or if I should ask them of Senator DeCamp. Maybe, Senator DeCamp, you have some amendments coming up, you might be able to answer these questions.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator DeCamp, will you respond to a question of Senator Smith, please.

SENATOR SMITH: I have about five questions here for you, Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Oh, okay.

SENATOR SMITH: All right, thank you. The first one is, I remember this legislation, I can remember it when I was campaigning that this was a discussion that was going on between the different opposing sides and we had legislation on this last year, didn't we, that put this in place, the central...the index?
