

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But we don't have to do that. What is the next provision?

SENATOR DECAMP: Oh, well, the next provision, oh, deals with fixture filings. Yeah, pretty important, right?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. You answered, thank you, Senator DeCamp. That is sufficient. Thank you. That added to the answers.

SENATOR DECAMP: No, it's an important amendment, it really is and I wouldn't offer it for any other reason.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, what has just been demonstrated is that this is a completely innocuous amendment of the kind Senator Schmit would talk about. It doesn't help anything, it doesn't hurt anything, it won't make anybody angry if they are not paying attention. But there are groups out there concerned about this bill and that item related to the centralized system. So if you want to put that system in place, adopt this amendment and delay the bill. If that amendment is not added, nothing is going to be done that is hurtful to anybody's interest. If you adopt it, you succeed in delaying the bill. I just thought I would call that to your attention because people such as myself and John DeCamp study the rules and we know what methods and tactics have to be used if you can't do something directly. So it is before you now and you can vote with that knowledge.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Lamb and then Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President and members, a question of Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR LAMB: I missed some of your statements. Did you say that this amendment is essential to this bill?

SENATOR DECAMP: No, I never said that.

SENATOR LAMB: Okay.

SENATOR DECAMP: I said it is ultimately going to be essential
