

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: ...Senator DeCamp, I didn't think it struck...or, Senator Chambers, I didn't think it struck anything but Senator DeCamp just whispered in my ear that he thought that maybe I had inadvertently by picking up the Rod Johnson amendment had actually undid that little change that he made just a few minutes ago and if I inadvertently did that, I will have to advertently correct it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The point I would like to have into the record is that we can't ask E & R to rewrite an amendment and when a bill is returned for a specific amendment it can only accommodate...

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the amendment that is before us at the time. So what Senator Johnson would have to do, I think, is either adopt this, readvance the bill, then return it and strike whatever he needs to strike to make it right or return the bill and start with an amendment that he wants. But I wouldn't want to see E & R asked to do whatever it is he was talking about.

SENATOR V. JOHNSON: I agree. I do agree.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Okay, Senator Nelson, did you want to speak on the Johnson amendment then?

SENATOR NELSON: I believe not. Naturally, I object to returning the bill again. I think I am not as eloquent in all the flamboyant terms and so on and I am not an attorney, but I can certainly see that there are two options to prevail and I know that, as Senator Chambers says, it is a stalling tactic again and we regroup and sometimes get our instructions and that is the way we will go. But I can see from the experience and every farm organization I think out there is against it. Also, I am opposed to this very last change on this bill but then I won't elaborate on that.
